Dear Friends,

When the Reverend Newton Pinckney Walker recognized that children in SC who were deaf did not have access to appropriate instruction, he decided to do something about it. He researched deaf education and, in January of 1849, opened a school in Spartanburg and began providing quality school programming for five students who were deaf. Five years later, he followed suit by establishing a program as well for students who were blind. I wonder if he knew that his legacy would still be going strong nearly 175 years later. I wonder if he realized that he was paving the way for access, empowerment, and equity.

As we celebrated SCSDB's Homecoming this fall, I was grateful for the incredible visionaries who paved the way for us to engage, empower, and equip students for success. It is wonderful to welcome back old faces, even as we continue to embrace a new generation. College prep lab science available on our campus

The School for the Blind staff is so grateful for the opportunity to offer chemistry, a high school lab science, to School for the Blind students.

This course offering will allow students to earn a lab science that counts towards requirements to go to a 4-year college. The lab will be open to students in other high school science courses as well as other grades. Students are required to pass a lab safety unit course before completing lab activities and working hands-on with equipment.

"The science lab would not be possible without the help from the SCSDB Foundation and their efforts to secure donors to support students' enriched learning experiences and environment," said Principal Valerie Feiling. The Foundation's support allows students to have access to specific lab tools and resources that are prepared for people with visual impairments. Students use lab equipment such as talking lab quests, talking thermometer, and liquid level indicator devices.

In addition, SCSDB Assistive Technology Specialist Allison Tracy worked with the high school students to identify which magnifiers assist in viewing content or lab items more effectively to complete the lab activities. The Foundation and School for the Blind hosted a ribbon cutting on Oct. 18 to officially open the science lab and show appreciation for the partners that made this opportunity possible.

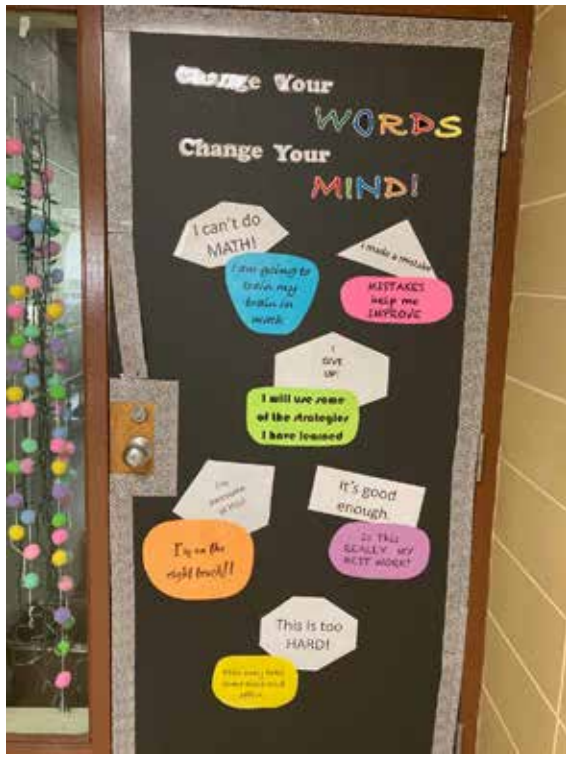

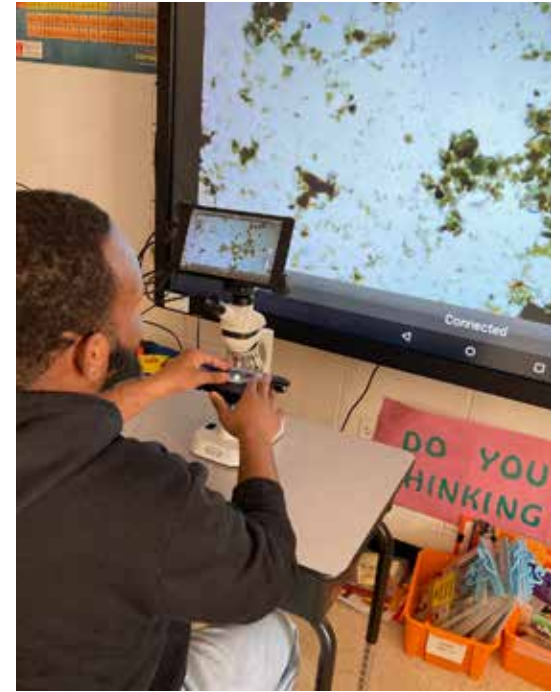

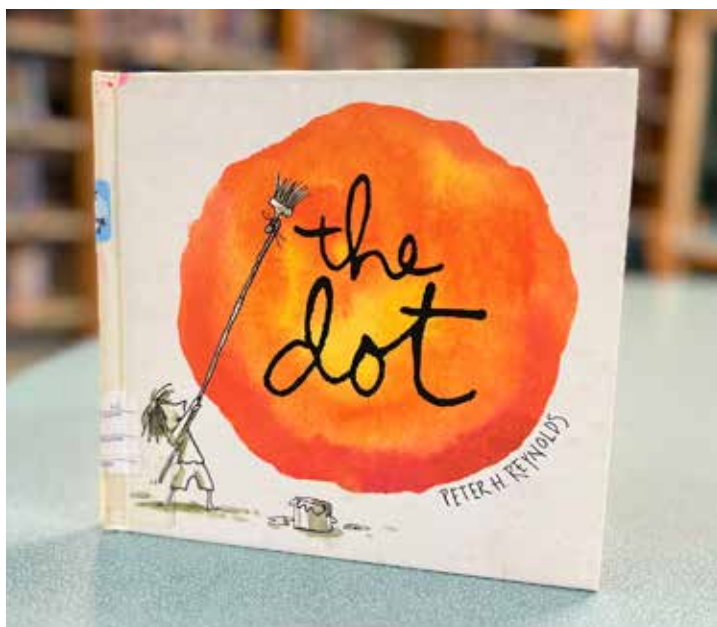

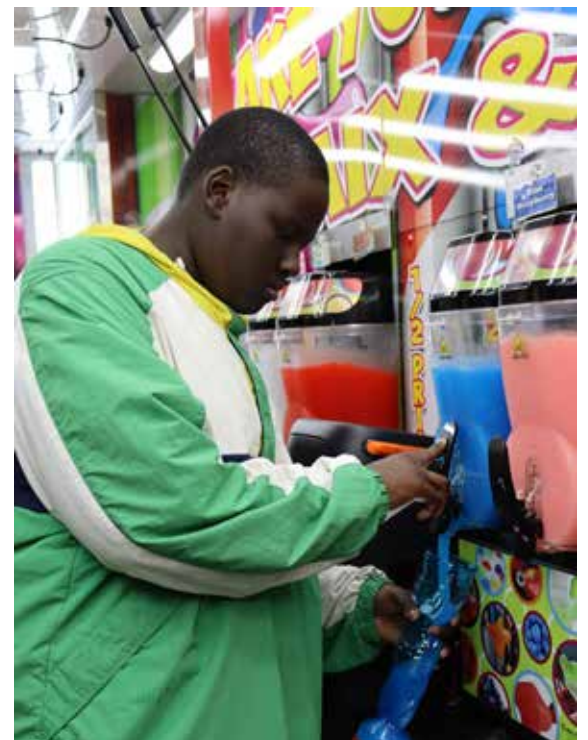

Kelly's Kids expands service, enrollment potential

Kelly's Kids has opened an additional classroom which allows the program to now serve 16 children!

In their partnership with Spartanburg County Early Head Start, Kelly's Kids can now go outside the border of Spartanburg County to serve children who are deaf/hard-of-hearing or blind/visually impaired.

To date, there are two children who are blind/visually impaired enrolled; five children who are deaf/hard-of-hearing enrolled; three children who are siblings of a child who is deaf/hard-of-hearing; and one child who is a child of a deaf adult (CODA). Out of these children, five of the families of these children are planning to complete an application to SCSDBI!

Kristin Milner, principal, Statewide Early Childhood Education Services, said that Kelly's Kids has hired two new teachers: Shea Brewton and Jacqueline Booker. "We are looking forward to a great year," she exclaimed.
